Background

This survey is being conducted by a team of university-based researchers working on a pan-Canadian project entitled “Engendering Public Engagement, Democratizing Public Space”. The project marks the 50th anniversary of the Royal Commission on the Status of Women (1968-1970). During the Royal Commission, women across Canada were consulted about their most pressing concerns and issues affecting their lives. The Commission received over 1,400 letters and briefs.

Fifty years later, we are asking: what issues matter most to women today?

The survey will be followed by a series of discussion groups across the province in fall of 2017. If you would like to participate in a discussion (in person or online), you can volunteer at the end of the survey; however, participating in the survey does not obligate you to participate in the discussion.

Our goal is to inform public policy in Saskatchewan and across the country. The more responses we have to the survey, the more powerful our recommendations will be.
